2023 BY THE NUMBERS

Pieces of legislation introduced, including:

- District Child Tax Credit Amendment Act of 2023: This measure would provide up to \$1,000 per child to District families and is a proven antipoverty proposal.
- School Safety Enhancement Amendment Act of 2023: Improving the safety of all District residents is essential. This legislation seeks to close critical gaps in current school safety supports and coordination.
- Black Queer History Commission Establishment Act of 2023: This bill will establish a first-of-its-kind commission to chronicle and preserve DC's Black queer history.
- → Co-introduced more than 140 additional pieces of legislation.

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BUILDING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES



HOUSING -

Led the fight against rent increases at rent-controlled properties, resulting in legislation capping rent increases at 6%



- Expanding housing options in Ward 5 across several major developments:
 - > Roberts Residences by SOME (So Others May Eat): 139 deeply affordable units at 1515 North Capitol St NE
 - > Providence Reimagined (Varnum St NE in Brookland)
 - WMATA Joint Developments (at Brookland-CUA and Fort Totten Metro Stations)
 - Howard University East Campus (1400 Shepherd St NE)
 - McMillan Sand Filtration Site (Reservoir District, community center and pool to open this year)



SCHOOLS AND RECREATION

- Visited all Ward 5 DCPS school facilities to assess maintenance and preparedness for SY23-24
- Secured funding in FY24 for new parks at 19th St and L St NE in Carver Langston and South Dakota Ave NE and Riggs Rd NE, which neighbors have sought for 10 years
- Introduced the School Improvement Amendment Act of 2023, which would establish the first-ever school support office within the Office of the State Superintendent for Education to improve low-performing schools
- Secured capital budget funds for improvements at Burroughs Elementary (\$231,721), McKinley Tech (\$100,000), Langdon Elementary (\$125,000), and Noyes Elementary (\$50,000)





PUBLIC AND TRAFFIC SAFETY

- Closed 8th Street gap on the Metropolitan Branch Trail
- Secured \$1 million for traffic safety improvements to South Dakota Ave NE
- Launched the Ward 5 Bus Task Force to inform WMATA's Better Bus Project Network Redesign



- Introduced the Establishment of Reasonable Controls for the Firearm Industry Amendment Act of 2023
- Co-introduced the Office of Unified Communications Transparency and Accuracy Amendment Act of 2023 to improve operations at the District's 911 call center

- Voted to fully fund the District's public safety apparatus and government partners, and voted in favor of public safety legislation to address the city's crisis of rising violence
- More than 3 dozen traffic safety and public safety walks with key government agencies including MPD, DBH, DDOT, violence interruption programs, DPW, and more to direct crime reduction resources to hot spots
- Secured additional CCTV cameras across
 Ward 5 strategically located to improve public safety
- Established the North Capitol Trust Builders
 Pilot to comprehensively address longstanding issues along the corridor

BUILDING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES



ENVIRONMENT AND INDUSTRIAL SPACE

- Introduced the Environmental Justice Amendment Act of 2023 to address environmental racism in Ward 5 and across the city
- Aided local businesses with Building Energy Performance Standards compliance
- Launched exploratory effort to exercise eminent domain of National Engineering Products, Inc., a notorious source of neighborhood pollution in Ivy City





BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT



- Ward 5 Business Roundtables with local entrepreneurs and business owners
- Introduced the Ward 5 Small Business Development Center Establishment Act of 2023 to provide resources and workforce development opportunities to local entrepreneurs and small businesses
- Advocated for and won expansion of Great Streets grant funding to make eligible previously excluded small businesses in Trinidad, Eckington, Arboretum, and Woodridge
- Convened and launched Community Wealth Building coalition to revive Marion Barry's cooperative economic development strategies



HEALTH AND WELLNESS

- Established the inaugural Ward 5 Senior Advisory Committee to center seniors in my approach to policy-making
- Hosted the Brookland Manor Health and Wellness Fair
- Co-hosted the Carver Langston Multi-Agency Resource Fair
- Brought back Ward 5 Day at Turkey Thicket Recreation Center (originally hosted by former Ward 5 Councilmember Harry Thomas, Sr.), enjoyed by hundreds of neighbors
- Hosted the inaugural Ward 5 Awards recognizing remarkable neighbors

- Hosted Ward 5 Day at Nationals Park
- Provided over 300 turkeys to Ward 5 neighbors during the holiday season
