Dear Secretary Smith,

Today, I am introducing the Child Behavioral Health Services Dashboard Act of 2024. Please find enclosed a signed copy of the legislation, which is co-introduced by Councilmembers Charles Allen, Anita Bonds, Matthew Frumin, Vincent C. Gray, and Robert C. White, Jr.

District children and their families are facing enormous pressures today, which manifest themselves in countless ways. Among the most alarming statistics are the high rates of truancy and absenteeism in District public schools. One facet of this problem is that many District children and families face delays finding behavioral health services to which they are referred. Most providers have their own website, where they regularly post information, updates, and resources, but those websites contain information for a variety of stakeholders, may not be easy for families and youth to navigate, and also may not reliably display whether they have capacity to provide services.

The Child Behavioral Health Services Dashboard Act of 2024 addresses this shortcoming by requiring the Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services to create a publicly available dashboard of behavioral health services in the District to ensure a system of care for children, youth, and their families. Other jurisdictions, including Philadelphia and Baltimore, have established centralized dashboards where this information is available in a single location to accelerate and simplify the process of finding services for children.<sup>1</sup> This bill complements the Showing Up for Students Amendment Act of 2024, which will result in the referral of more children and families to the Department of Human Services.

30	be cited as the "Child Behavioral Health	Services Dashboard Act of 2024".
31	Sec. 2. Definitions.	
32	For the purposes of this act:	
33	(1) The term "behavioral health" means a person's overall social, emotional, and	
34	psychological well-being and development.	
35	(2) The term "behavioral health t	reatment services" means stand-alone and co-
36	occurring, integrated treatment services for subs	tance abuse and mental health disorders that are

37 designed to promote a person's behavioral health.

38	(3) The term "behavioral health screening" means a brief process designed to
39	identify youth who are at risk of having behavioral health disorders that warrant immediate
40	attention, or intervention, or to identify the need for further assessment with a more
41	comprehensive examination.
42	(4) The term "behavioral health prevention and early intervention services" means
43	services that aim to intervene during pregnancy and the early periods in childhood development,
44	focusing on infants, toddlers, young children, and their families and are intended to address the
45	key drivers that cause children and youth to require crisis intervention services.
46	(5) The term "managed care organization" means an organization of physicians
47	and allied health professionals organized to and capable of providing systematic and
48	comprehensive medical care and treatment of injured employees which is designated by the
49	Mayor to provide such care and treatment.
50	(5) "System of care for children, youth, and their families" means a community
51	support system for children or youth with mental health problems and their families, which is
52	developed through collaboration in the administration, financing, resource allocation, training,
53	and delivery of services across all appropriate public systems.
54	Sec. 3. By September 30, 2025, the Deputy Mayor of Health and Human Services shall
55	create a publicly available, online directory that reports on the currently available behavioral
56	health screening, behavioral health prevention and early intervention services, and behavioral
57	health treatment services in the District to ensure a system of care for children, youth, and their
58	families. The website shall be updated regularly to include:
59	(a) The real-time status of:

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60	(1) The number of beds available for behavioral health inpatient treatment	
61	services in the District; and	
62	(2) The estimated wait time and capacity by provider and/or organization for	
63	behavioral health screening, prevention and early intervention, or treatment services in the	
64	District;	
65	(b) A calendar of behavioral health events offered by District government agencies and	
66	community based organizations;	
67	(c) A directory of available behavioral health screening, prevention and early	
68	intervention, or treatment services in the District, contact information and relevant links, that	
69	allows users to filter available providers by key features, including:	
70	(1) The age of population served;	
71	(2) The services provided;	
72	(3) The types of therapy offered;	
73	(4) The languages spoken by the provider;	
74	(5) The ethnicity of the provider;	
75	(6) Whether the service is LGBTQIA+ friendly;	
76	(7) The gender of the provider;	
77	(8) The types of insurance accepted;	
78	(9) The zip code where the services are provided; and	
79	(10) The availability of telehealth.	
80	(d) Links to behavioral health resources currently offered by:	
81	(1) The Department of Health;	
82	(2) The Department of Behavioral Health;	

83	(3) The Department of Human Services; and	
84	(4) Managed Care Organizations contracted by the District.	
85	Sec. 4. The Deputy Mayor of Health and Human Services shall consult with the following	
86	entities to inform the website creation and support continued implementation of the website:	
87	(1) The Office of Chief Technology Officer;	
88	(2) The Child and Family Services Agency;	
89	(3) The Department of Health;	
90	(4) The Department of Behavioral Health;	
91	(5) The Department of Health Care Finance;	
92	(6) At least one Managed Care Organizations;	
93	(7) The D.C. Primary Care Association;	
94	(8) The D.C. Behavioral Health Association;	
95	(9) The D.C. Hospital Association;	
96	(10) An individual or entity with expertise is health information systems; and	
97	(11) Community members and advocates with current or past experience	
98	navigating health services in the District.	
99	Sec. 4. Fiscal impact statement.	
100	The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement in the committee report as the fiscal	
101	impact statement required by section 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of 1975,	
102	approved October 16, 2006 (120 Stat. 2038; D.C. Official Code § 1-301.47a).	
103	Sec. 5. Effective date.	
104	This act shall take effect after approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto by the	
105	Mayor, action by the Council to override the veto), a 30-day period of congressional review as
